INTRODUCTION

The Western Health Partnership was established in 2014 and drives collaborative clinical research that provides Western Health staff and students with the opportunity to engage in clinically focussed, multidisciplinary research and training across acute, chronic, rehabilitation, community healthcare, and maternity settings. The Partnership is committed to improving the healthcare experience and safety outcomes of patients, women, and their neonates. It also strives to support the role of nurses and midwives in their workforce development, with the ultimate aim to deliver world class health outcomes for our large and diverse community in Melbourne's west.

The Western Health Partnership is unique as it is the only partnership dedicated to both nursing and midwifery, with clinical Chairs for each discipline.

The Partnership is led by:

Professor Bodil Rasmussen (Nursing)



Professor Bodil Rasmussen is Chair of Nursing in the partnership with Deakin University and Western Health. Bodil has been involved in diabetes education for more than 20 years, with 10 of those as the Course Director of Graduate Certificate of Diabetes at the School of Nursing and Midwifery, Deakin University. Her program of research investigates the impact of changes during life transitions on self-management and risk management among adults with diabetes and her methodological expertise includes qualitative research methods, especially grounded theory and other interpretative qualitative methodologies, and large survey analysis.

She is an international leader in diabetes nursing research and education and a member of the Scandinavian Translational Research in Chronic Conditions (SCAN-TRICC) Group. She works in partnership with professional national and international diabetes organisations and with world renowned researchers in the field of self-management in chronic illness. Professor Rasmussen also leads numerous projects in self-management of chronic conditions in Denmark.

Professor Linda Sweet (Midwifery)



Professor Linda Sweet is Chair of Midwifery in the partnership with Deakin University and Western Health. Linda's portfolio responsibility is to undertake research and build research capacity within Western Health, including understanding research and research translation. Whilst this is an organisation wide role, the primary focus is on midwifery research and maternity service improvements with a multidisciplinary focus.

Linda is a member of the Midwifery Accreditation Committee that endorses all midwifery education programs across Australia, and is the Deputy Editor for Women and Birth, the international journal of the Australian College of Midwives, and peer review for numerous Q1 journals.

Linda has over 20 years academic experience, and was previously the Head of Midwifery and Higher Degree Research coordinator at Flinders University, Adelaide. She has extensive experience in curriculum development and have held numerous Unit Chair positions in the Master of Clinical Education and the Bachelor of Midwifery at Flinders University.

Our Chairs are supported by a highly-skilled team of researchers from a range of backgrounds, who working closely with clinicians and researchers from all health disciplines. Postgraduate research students (Honours, Masters, PhD's) also contribute to the Partnership's research activities.







OUR RESEARCH AGENDA

The Partnership's researchers specialise in developing robust evidence for how best to support and care for all people, particularly those living with chronic and complex conditions and their families, and childbearing women and their families. We focus on health care service research that partners with consumers in co-design, with particular interest in the areas of chronic conditions management, technology use in healthcare, health workforce development and support, gender and health, and enhancing maternity services.

Nursing & Midwifery Research at Western Health focuses on improving patient experiences and outcomes and contributing significantly to building research capacity among our nurses and midwives. The strategic activities areas in the Centre are:

Work with consumers-as partners on research that engages our community and focuses on Best Care

Support the development of staff and students to be collaborators and consumers of research

Conduct research that builds evidence for the future in a sustainable and socially accountable manner

Collaborate with internal and external multidisciplinary stakeholders to undertake quality research

Conduct innovative research that enables continuous improvement and practice development

Examples:

- Evaluate the effectiveness of nursing and/or midwifery care provision based on the best available evidence.
- Use research evidence to identify and translate clinical risks
- Demonstrate the specific contributions of nursing and/or midwifery practice to the quality and safety of healthcare
- Empower our community to enhance their health outcomes
- Use research evidence to optimise consumer outcomes under a range of clinical conditions, especially focusing on chronic and complex conditions and maternal and infant wellbeing
- Partner in co-design with consumers, their carers, and communities in research

Examples:

- Use research evidence to guide the design of health care environments in a range of different contexts
- Empower nurses, midwives, and other health workers to develop and conduct research in collaborative and supportive teams
- Evaluate the effectiveness of nursing and midwifery care provision based on the best available evidence.
- Use research evidence to identify and translate supportive and sustained measures in nursing and midwifery teams and the care
 they provide

Examples:

- Develop, implement, and evaluate approaches to person-centred care with the focus on consumer experiences and quality of health outcomes.
- Understand and respond to changing health care needs of communities in both acute and chronic situations in a sustainable way
- Use research evidence to meet changes in community healthcare needs and design services that accommodate those needs
- Evaluate the effectiveness of nursing and midwifery educational strategies in terms of patient outcomes, best and safe care.

Examples:

- Use WH-Deakin research centre to build research capacity among nurses and midwives by supporting research projects and supervision of Honours, Masters, and PhD students.
- Use research evidence to guide development and implementation of nursing and midwifery workforce initiatives to ensure optimal use of skills and knowledge, practice to full scope, skill mix etc.
- Build effective research collaborations at local, national, and international levels, advancing the reputation of WH research

Examples:

- Use research evidence to guide development and implementation of new nursing and midwifery models of care.
- Evaluate health care technologies with specific focus on the role of the nurse or midwife in the interface between them and the consumer.
- Conduct research to develop and implement healthcare strategies that meet the needs of at-risk community groups such as
 those from cultural-linguistic diverse and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander backgrounds to improve their health and wellbeing.
